

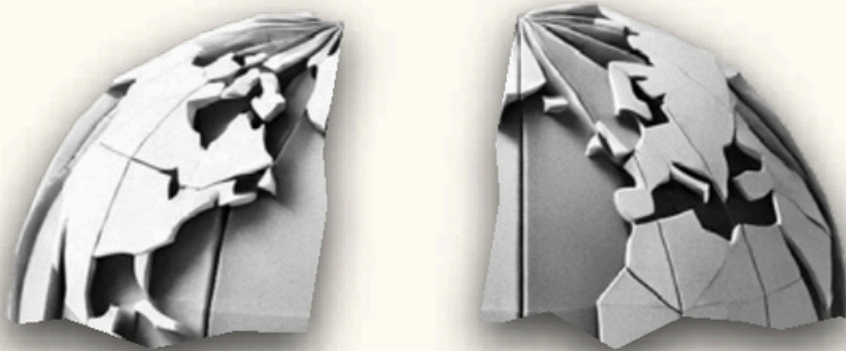

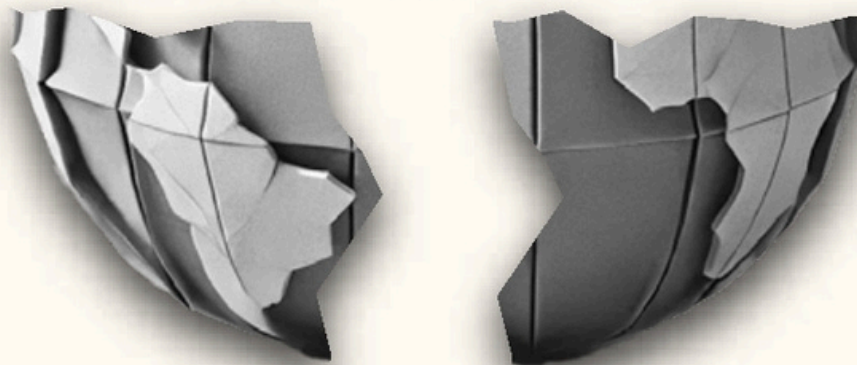

WELCOME & OPENING REMARKS

LUIS VASSY, PRESIDENT, SCIENCES PO

Luis Vassy is the President of Sciences Po and Administrator of the Fondation nationale des sciences politiques.

Prior to this appointment in he served for twenty years as a French Diplomat (2004- 2024). He specialized on South Asia and nuclear non-proliferation, before taking the role of press advisor and spokesperson at the Embassy in Washington, DC. (2008-2012). Mr Vassy held

several senior roles within the French Ministry of Defense, first Deputy Diplomatic Advisor, then as chief of staff to the Minister of Veterans Affairs, before taking the position of advisor to the Minister of Defense . In 2017, he was appointed deputy chief of staff to the Minister for Europe and Foreign Affairs. In 2019, he served as Ambassador of France to the Netherlands and Permanent Representative to the Organisation for the Prohibition of Chemical Weapons.



ARANCHA GONZÁLEZ, DEAN, PSIA

Arancha González is the third Dean of the Paris School of International Affairs (PSIA) at Sciences Po and the first woman to lead the world's third school for Politics and International Studies.



Prior to joining PSIA, Ms González served as Spain's Minister of Foreign Affairs, European Union and Cooperation (2020-2021). She previously was Assistant-Secretary-General of the United Nations and Executive Director of the International Trade Centre (2013-2020). Between 2005 and 2013 she served as Chief of Staff to the Director-General of the World Trade Organization, Pascal Lamy. Before that she held senior positions at the European Commission in the areas of international trade and development. Ms González started her career as a lawyer in the private sector.

Ms González holds a degree in law from the University of Navarra and a Postgraduate Degree in European Law from the University Carlos III of Madrid.



KEYNOTE SPEECH

MATHIAS CORMANN, SECRETARY-GENERAL, OECD

Mathias Cormann is the 6th Secretary-General of the Organisation for Economic Co-operation and Development (OECD). His five-year term commenced on 1 June 2021.

Working with OECD members, his priorities as Secretary-General include optimising post-COVID recovery; responding to the economic and social impacts of the war in Ukraine; leadership on climate action; fronting a digital transformation; establishing well-functioning global markets; and advancing OECD standards.

Prior to his appointment to the OECD, Cormann served as the Australian Minister for Finance, the Leader of the Government in the Australian Senate and as Federal Senator representing the State of Western Australia.

In these roles, he has been a strong advocate for the positive power of open markets, free trade, and the importance of a rules-based international trading system. Mathias had graduated in law at the Flemish Catholic University of Louvain (Leuven), following studies at the University of Namur and, as part of the European Erasmus Student Exchange Program, at the University of East Anglia.

Between 1997 and 2003, he worked as Chief of Staff as well as Senior Adviser to various State and Federal Ministers in Australia and for the Premier of Western Australia.

Between 2003 and 2007, he worked for major Western Australian health insurer HBF in a range of senior management roles.

RÉMY RIOUX,
DIRECTOR-GENERAL,
AGENCE FRANÇAISE
DE DÉVELOPPEMENT

An expert in economics and international financial institutions, Rémy Rioux has held high-level positions in a career devoted to development, climate and Africa. After serving as chief of staff of the French Economy and Finance Minister Pierre Moscovici, he was appointed by Laurent Fabius Deputy Secretary General of the



Ministry for Foreign Affairs and International Development, and coordinated the finance agenda for the French presidency of COP21.

Rémy Rioux is heading the French Development Agency (AFD) since 2016, which has seen its mandate expanded and its resources significantly increased. He was reappointed by President Macron and the French Parliament for two additional terms, in 2019 and in 2022. In 2017, he also became Chairman of the International Development Finance Club (IDFC) – the leading group of 26 national and regional development banks and the largest provider of climate finance globally. A position he has held until October 2023, when the Club elected the Presidents of Bancoldex (Colombian development bank) and BOAD (West African Development Bank) as co-chairs for a 2-year mandate. He is now Vice-Chairman of IDFC.

In November 2020, Rémy Rioux hosted the first Finance in Common Summit in Paris inviting, for the first time ever, all 530 public development banks from all over the world, which now form a global coalition to collectively shift their strategies, investment patterns, activities and operating modalities to contribute to the achievement of the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) and the objectives of the Paris Agreement. He is chairing the Finance in Common (FiCS) Executive Committee.



PASCAL SAINT-AMANS, PARTNER, BRUNSWICK GROUP

Pascal advises clients worldwide on policy and regulatory matters, including tax-related issues.

Prior to joining Brunswick, Pascal was director of the Centre for Tax Policy and Administration at the OECD where, working with G20 countries, he led the international tax policy reform, including ending bank secrecy or updating the rules for the taxation of Multinational

Enterprises, known as the BEPS (Base Erosion and Profit Shifting) project. Pascal supported countries in designing their tax policies and provided technical assistance to developing countries. He launched the Tax Inspectors Without Borders Initiative.

Pascal graduated from the National School of Administration (ENA) in 1996, and was an official in the French Ministry for Finance for nearly a decade. He held various positions within the Treasury. He was also a member of the UN Group of Experts on International Co-operation in Tax Matters, becoming a “rapporteur” in 2006.

Pascal also served as Financial Director of the Energy Regulation Committee between 1999 and 2002 and was responsible for the introduction of new electricity tariffs.

Having earned a degree in history, Pascal also received a degree from the Institut d'études politiques of Paris, and is Professor of Taxes at Lausanne University.

Dr Vera Songwe is Chair of the Liquidity and Sustainability Facility. Songwe is co-chair of the High Level Panel on Finance for Climate Action. She is member of the Global Financial Alliance for Net Zero (GFANZ). She is a nonresident senior fellow at the Brookings Institution. Songwe was previously



Under-Secretary-General at the United Nations and Executive Secretary of the United Nations Economic Commission for Africa. Dr Songwe has been recognized as one of Africa’s 100 most influential people in 2022 and was a recipient of the All Africa Continental Leadership Award. She was named one of the nominees for Forbes Africa 50 Top Women in 2023. She recently co-authored a book entitled “ Régional Integration in West Africa: Is There a Role for a Single Currency? “

She has held a number of senior positions at the World Bank, and the International Finance Corporation. Her main areas of interest are financial stability, macro-prudential policy, fiscal and monetary policy, innovative financing mechanisms for development, climate finance, agriculture, energy, and economic governance. She has extensive experience working in Africa, East Asia, Europe and Central Asia and South Asia regions.

Prior to joining the Bank, Dr Songwe was a Visiting Scholar at the University of Southern California and at the Federal Reserve Bank of Minneapolis. She holds a PhD. in Mathematical Economics from the Center for Operations Research & Econometrics from the Catholic University of Louvain-la-Neuve in Belgium. She holds a BA in Economics and a BA in Political Science from the University of Michigan, Ann Arbor.

Mr. Thierry Watrin is the current Lead of UNECA's Sustainable Debt Coalition, where he unites governments to reframe debt as an engine for sustainable development. Previously, as Chief Advisor to Rwanda's Minister of

Public Investment, he spearheaded mission-driven initiatives in public investment, innovative metrics like Green GDP, and led pioneering negotiations positioning Rwanda as a global climate finance leader.

Beyond his professional roles, he lectures on Climate Diplomacy at Sciences Po Paris (PSIA), inspiring the next generation to bridge climate divides for a more resilient and inclusive future.

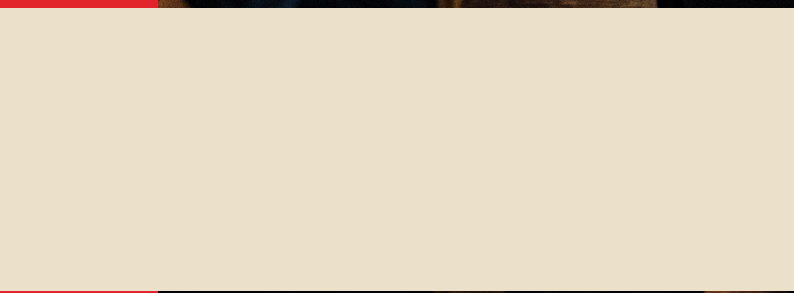

Disa Jironet has worked for the Dutch Prosecutors' Office since 2008, and in the role of prosecutor since 2017. She has previously specialized in youth crime and is currently working as a prosecutor for the National Expertise Centre on Discrimination in Amsterdam.

Prior to her work at the Prosecutor's Office she worked for Dutch human rights lawyer Liesbeth Zegveld and at the International Criminal Tribunal for the former Yugoslavia. She is also an author and a speaker, her first book "Crime and Compassion" (Ambo|Anthos) was published in 2020, and went to a third reprint within the first six months. She is currently working on her second book. The underlying theme in her work is around the role that justice plays in society and on keeping human interests at the heart of complex (legal) systems.

NGOZI OKONJO-IWEALA, DIRECTOR-GENERAL, WORLD TRADE ORGANIZATION

Dr Ngozi Okonjo-Iweala is the Director-General of the World Trade Organization (WTO), a role she assumed in March 2021, becoming the first woman and African to hold the position. A global finance expert and development economist with over 40 years of experience, she has



worked across continents, leading transformative initiatives in public and international finance. Dr Okonjo-Iweala previously served as Nigeria's Finance Minister and briefly as Foreign Minister, where she spearheaded critical reforms, including negotiating the cancellation of \$18 billion of Nigeria's debt with the Paris Club. She also had a distinguished 25-year career at the World Bank, rising to the position of Managing Director of Operations.

A passionate advocate for sustainable development and poverty reduction, Dr Okonjo-Iweala has held leadership roles in organizations such as Gavi, the Vaccine Alliance, and served as AU and WHO Special Envoy during the COVID-19 pandemic. She is widely recognized for her negotiating skills and consensus-building, having brokered impactful agreements that benefit diverse stakeholders. Her extensive accolades include being named among Forbes' 100 Most Powerful Women and TIME's 100 Most Influential People.

An alumna of Harvard University and MIT, Dr Okonjo-Iweala has authored several influential books on leadership, governance, and economic reform. She serves on numerous global boards and advisory councils, including the Earthshot Prize and the Global Commission on the Economy and Climate. Married to Dr Ikemba Iweala, she is a proud mother of four and grandmother to five.



Moderator: Steven Erlanger, Chief diplomatic correspondent in Europe, The New York Times

Steven Erlanger is the Chief Diplomatic Correspondent of The New York Times, now based in Berlin after six years in Brussels, from August 2017. He was London bureau chief of The New York Times for four years, from August 2013, after five years as bureau

chief in Paris and before that, four years as bureau chief in Jerusalem. He has served as Berlin bureau chief, bureau chief for Central Europe and the Balkans, based in Prague, and chief diplomatic correspondent, based in Washington. From 1991 to 1995, he was posted in Moscow, after being Bangkok bureau chief and Southeast Asia correspondent from 1988 to 1991. In New York, he was Culture Editor from 2002 to 2004.

Previously, he worked for The Boston Globe. He was European correspondent, based in London, 1983-87, and deputy national and foreign editor. He reported from Eastern Europe, Moscow and revolutionary Iran.

He shared the 2017 Pulitzer Prize for International Reporting for a series on Russia and shared another for Explanatory Reporting for a series on Al Qaeda awarded in 2002. He also has won ASNE's 2001 Jesse Laventhol prize for deadline reporting for his work in the former Yugoslavia and the German Marshall Fund's Peter Weitz Prize in 2000. He was awarded the 2005 Eliav-Sartawi Award for Middle East journalism. In 2013, France made him a chevalier of the Légion d'Honneur.

He was graduated from Harvard College in 1974 and studied Russian at St. Antony's College, Oxford.

Antonio Patriota has been Ambassador of Brazil to the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland since August 2023. He served as Foreign Minister from 2011 to 2013, and Deputy Foreign Minister from 2009 to 2010.



Patriota was Ambassador of Brazil to Egypt (2019-2023), Italy (2016-2019), and to the United States (2007-2009), as well as Permanent Representative of Brazil to the United Nations (2013-2016).

During his period as Ambassador to the UN, Patriota was Chairman of the 60th and 61st Sessions of the Commission on the Status of Women and Chairman of the Peacebuilding Commission of the UN (2013-2014). During his diplomatic career, he was also posted in Geneva (1983-1987 and 1999-2003), New York (1994-1999), Beijing (1987-1988) and Caracas (1988-1990).

Ambassador Patriota is a member of the “Leaders for Peace” initiative under the chairmanship of former French Prime Minister Raffarin.

Hugh T. Dugan served in the National Security Council under President Trump as Special Assistant to the President and Senior Director for International Organization Affairs. Mr Dugan has

over 25 years of experience shaping US foreign policy within the United Nations System and international organizations, focusing on peace, security, development, and human rights. He served as Acting Special Presidential Envoy for Hostage Affairs, achieving significant recoveries, and advised 11 US Permanent Representatives to the UN. During his tenure as US Delegate, he negotiated thousands of resolutions and led critical initiatives, including the most extensive UN reform under Helms-Biden legislation, which ensured \$1 billion in US arrears payments and long-term savings.

An accomplished diplomat, Mr. Dugan has held roles at the US Mission to Geneva, the State Department, and embassies worldwide. He is a Senior Fellow at Seton Hall University, media commentator, and co-founder of DOGE-UN, a project targeting UN inefficiencies. He has received numerous awards, including from the International Olympic Committee, for his work on the Olympic Truce and sports diplomacy. A graduate of Georgetown University, Fletcher School of Law and Diplomacy, and Wharton, he also serves on several boards, including the James W. Foley Legacy Foundation and the YMCA of Greater New York.

Melissa Fleming is the United Nations Under-Secretary-General for Global Communications, leading the Department of Global Communications. In this role, she oversees strategic and crisis communications, multilingual news services, UN social media platforms and global campaigns.

Her international team informs audiences about the state of the world, while engaging them to make it more just, peaceful and sustainable.

Promoting healthy information ecosystems, while addressing mis- and disinformation and hate speech, is a key focus of her work. She recently led the development of the UN Global Principles for Information Integrity.

Her extensive UN experience includes 10 years as UNHCR Head of Global Communications, where she worked to build empathy and support for the world's refugees, displaced and stateless people.

She previously held communications leadership positions at the IAEA, the OSCE, and Radio Free Europe/Radio Liberty and also worked as a journalist.

She is author of the book, *A Hope More Powerful than the Sea*, and host of the UN podcast *Awake at Night*. She is a frequent public speaker and publishes widely on strategic communications and media. She holds a Master's in Journalism from Boston University and a B.A. from Oberlin College.

Mr Stefano Sannino is the Secretary-General of the European External Action Service (EEAS) of the European Union since 1 January 2021. He held the post of the Deputy Secretary General for Economic and Global Issues at the

EEAS from April 2020 to December 2021. From March 2016 to April 2020 he was Ambassador of Italy to Spain and Andorra. From July 2013 until March 2016 he held the position of Permanent Representative of Italy to the EU in Brussels. After a period at the Cabinet of the President of the Commission (from 2002 to 2004) he joined the Directorate General for External Relations as Director for Crisis Management and Representative at PSC (2004-2006), then Director for Latin America (2008-2009) and finally as Deputy Director General for Asia and Latin America (2009-2010).

In 2010 he moved to the Directorate General for Enlargement as Deputy Director General and later as Director General, a position he held until June 2013. From 2006 to 2008 he was the Diplomatic Advisor to the Italian Prime Minister and his Personal Representative to G8 summits.

He has also held the position of Ambassador and Head of the OSCE Mission in Belgrade from 2001 to 2002 and within the Italian Diplomatic Service: Deputy Head of Mission of the Italian Embassy in Belgrade (1994-1996), Head of the Secretariat of the Under-Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs (1996-1998), Diplomatic Advisor and Head of the Cabinet of the Minister of Foreign Trade (1998-2001). Mr Sannino is fluent in Spanish, English and French beyond his native Italian.

HRH began his schooling at the Model School in Taif and went on to gain his high school diploma at the Lawrenceville School in New Jersey, the United States of America. HRH then completed his studies at the Georgetown University.

HRH was appointed Advisor at the Royal Court in 1393H/1973. In 1397H/1977, HRH was appointed Director-General of the General Intelligence Directorate (GID), Saudi Arabia's main foreign intelligence service, with the rank of Minister, and headed the GID until 1422H/2001.

In 1423H/2002, HRH was appointed Saudi Arabian Ambassador to the United Kingdom and the Republic of Ireland. HRH served in the position until 1426H/2005 when he was appointed Saudi Arabian Ambassador to the United States of America. He retired in 1428H/2007.

In 2024, he became Co-Chair of the Steering Committee of Business Interlocutors for the 4th International Conference on Financing for Development (FfD4) and serves on UN-related boards, including the UN Global Compact and UNICEF’s Generation Unlimited (GenU).

A founding member of the Business 20 (B20), John co-chairs its Finance and Infrastructure Task Force and is a patron of the UN Refugee Agency (UNHCR) in Australia. He also chairs the ICC Merchants of Peace Foundation and the Moeller Institute Advisory Board at the University of Cambridge, with board roles at IFM Global Investors, Veracity, and the African Green Infrastructure Investment Bank (AfGIIB).

She has served Ecuador as Minister of Foreign Affairs (twice), Minister of National Defense, and Coordinating Minister of Natural and Cultural Heritage. She was the first woman to become Permanent Representative of Ecuador to the United Nations in New York (2008).

Currently, she is President of Cities Alliance and Executive Director of Global Women Leaders for Change and Inclusion.

Zhang Weiwei is a distinguished professor of international relations and Director of the China Institute at Fudan University, a board member of China's National Think Tanks Council and a senior fellow at the Chunqiu Institute.

He holds a Ph.D in International Relations from Geneva University.

A former visiting fellow at Oxford, he was professor of international relations at the Geneva School of Diplomacy and International Relations and senior research fellow at the Centre for Asian Studies, Geneva University.

He had worked as a senior English interpreter for Deng Xiaoping and other Chinese leaders in the mid-1980s. He has travelled to over 100 countries.

He is the author of the best-selling and award-winning "China Trilogy" (published by the Shanghai People's Press) of Zhongguo Chudong (the China Ripple), Zhongguo Zhenhan (the China Wave) and Zhongguo Chaoyue (the China Horizon, and the English editions of the latter two were published by World Century, New Jersey, in 2012 and 2016 respectively).

He predicted in 2011 that the Arab Spring would soon become the Arab winter in a much publicized debate with Francis Fukuyama, the author of the End of History and the Last man. His other works include Ideology and Economic Reform under Deng Xiaoping (Kegan Paul, London, 1996), Transforming China: Economic Reform and its Political Implications (Macmillan, London and St. Martins, New York, 2000) and Reshaping Cross-Strait Relations: Ideas and Reflections (CAS, Geneva, 2006).

He has written extensively in Chinese and English on China's political and economic reforms, the China model of development, China's foreign policy and comparative political governance.

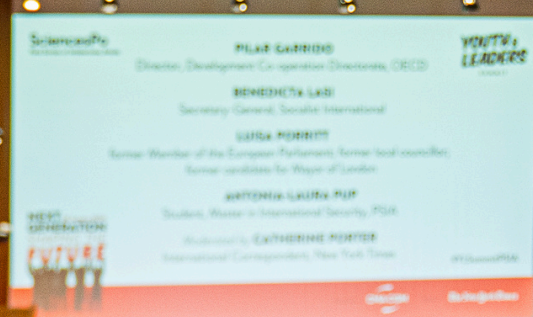
